

GUIDANCE FOR VISITING RESIDENTS AT FELLOWSHIP COMMUNITY
Manor, Terrace and Villa Buildings

1. Visitation is allowed at all times for all residents

2. Visitation rules and core infection control principles:

- Enter through the Manor, Villa or Terrace front entrance and review the posted COVID screening questions. Please do NOT visit if you are ill.
- Utilize the electronic kiosk to complete visitor check in and obtain visitor ID badge. The ID badge must be on and visible during your visit.
- **Residents & visitors must wear a surgical mask that will be available at the entrance. The mask must be properly fitted over the nose and mouth at all times while visiting, traveling through the buildings or in common areas.** This also applies to children over 2 years of age. There are no exceptions. Mask wearing will be strictly enforced.
- Refrain from eating or drinking during your visit.
- Maintain a 6-foot social distance from residents and staff as much as possible.
- Use hand sanitizer before and after visitation.
- Proceed to the nursing station for the area your loved one resides in for any resident specific instructions if you have been informed about an outbreak or exposure situation. Our current COVID cases can be found on our website, our internal TV message boards, through our One Call updates, and by asking at the nurses' station.
- Sign out using the kiosk, at the end of your visit.
- If you have been exposed to COVID, we request that you do not visit for 10 days; however, if you remain asymptomatic and test negative on day 5, you may visit wearing an N95 mask. At day 10, if you are still asymptomatic, you may return to visiting with a surgical mask on.
- If you have tested positive for COVID please do not visit until at least 10 days have passed and your symptoms have improved.
- Notify the nursing staff if you have been exposed or contracted the virus within 48 hours of your last visit.
- Non-compliance may result in termination of visitation privileges.
- Refer to CDC guidance for vaccination recommendations, and speak with your medical professional.
