THE ABIDER PROGRAM: A Ministry of Presence

Recognizing that many individuals may not have loved ones nearby during their final moments, Fellowship established the Abider Program to provide emotional and spiritual support to residents. This "ministry of presence" ensures that residents are not left in solitude.

Through this initiative, the staff and independent living residents at Fellowship Community emphasize the importance of ensuring that those approaching the end of their lives have a comforting presence by their side if they wish.

People's needs can vary, but having someone beside them to offer a calm, supportive presence often brings peace. The Abider Program addresses these needs by assigning volunteers to sit with residents for periods ranging from two to four hours. During this time, abiders offer care, reassurance, prayers and Christ-exalting music or simply their silent companionship, providing comfort in ways that the resident requests, helping to create a sense of serenity during their last hours.

Launched in October 2023, the program has had a profound impact — not just on the residents, but on the abiders, their families and the staff as well. The volunteers, made up of staff members and independent living residents, find deep meaning in their role.

As Pastor Phil Yerrington shared, "This program allows us to minister to people. It also gives volunteers a sense of purpose and value, knowing that they are fulfilling a critical need."

Vanessa Miller, social worker and Abider Program developer, further highlighted the program's significance, calling it "deeply cherished by our staff" as they witness the positive impact it has on everyone involved.

Additionally, the program offers peace of mind to the families of those benefiting from the companionship. For many, the inability to be present during a loved one's final hours can be heartbreaking. However, knowing that an abider is present offers relief and comfort, easing the emotional burden and ensuring that no one passes away without care and companionship. The Abider Program provides vital support not only to the resident, but also to their loved ones during the transition.

"Being a part of the Abider Program is truly a blessing," adds Pastor Phil. "Those who participate in the Abider Program have the pleasure of knowing that they were used by the Lord at a critical time in the life of a resident. There truly is great joy in serving Jesus."

PEP RALLY FOSTERS CONNECTIONS ACROSS GENERATIONS

various decades, including the 1960s, with the students. This educational exchange fostered meaningful connections, and the pep rally provided a perfect venue for these connections to deepen.



DONOR SPOTLIGHT HAL & JOYCE MANTE

When driving down Eberhart Road in Whitehall, you can't miss the gigantic U.S. flag that adorns the side of the American Fence & Flag building. This enormous 30-foot-by-50-foot flag, which is the largest hanging flag in the Lehigh Valley, stretches almost as tall and as long as the office building.

In 2012, Harold Mante, the company's president and founder, had the idea to purchase a very large U.S. flag to fly from Sept. 11 (Patriot Day) to Nov. 11 (Veterans Day).

He said, "It turned out to be a HUGE hit and people were so excited (and continue to be) that we made the decision to have it be a permanent part of our company. The flag was made in the U.S. with U.S.-manufactured materials. We are looking forward to celebrating the USA's 250th birthday in 2026."

Hal's experience working for a national fence company led him to eventually start his own business, and American Fence was incorporated in 1983. It subsequently evolved into American Fence & Flag, and has been at its present location in Whitehall since 1987. The company supplies and installs fence, railings, flags and flagpoles and offers a large inventory of materials and parts for do-it-yourselfers and contractors.

The business truly is a family operation, with wife Joyce handling administrative duties, while daughter Jenne and son-in-law Tyler work in sales. Sadly, they lost a son, James, at the age of 14.

The enormity of that flag hanging on the building mirrors the philanthropic and community-minded spirit of the couple.

As owners of a locally owned and operated

company, they are proud to support the Lehigh Valley community. They stand by the business' stated purpose – to glorify and trust in God by being faithful stewards of all that has been entrusted to this company – and since 2001, have given 1% of gross sales and 10% of net profit to a variety of nonprofits.

"We focus on organizations with Christian values and/or those which directly help people who are challenged in some way," Joyce stated. "That's why we support Fellowship. As a faith-based senior living community, their values align with ours."

American Fence & Flag and the Mante family have been giving to Fellowship for well over a decade.

"We appreciate their Christ-like compassion and caring and the fact that the Spirit Fund (charitable care) ensures that residents are not forced to leave Fellowship if they run out of resources," Joyce continued. "We aim to positively affect people we encounter every day. It is our goal to share God's love and the resources with which He has entrusted us to make our corner of the world better."

Falafel

115-oz. can chick peas
2 oz. chopped scallions
1 tsp. garlic
1 tsp. cumin
½ cup olive oil
1 cup flour
Salt and pepper to taste

Mix in food processor until smooth.
Form into 2 oz. balls.

Fry in oil.

Hummus

115-oz. can chick peas
2 oz. chopped scallions
1 tsp. garlic
1 tsp. cumin
½ cup olive oil
¼ cup lemon juice
Salt and pepper to taste
Mix in food processor until

smooth.
Garnish with olive oil and parsley.

Tabouli

½ lb. bulgar
Dried Za'atar
1 red onion, diced
2 cucumbers, seeded and diced
½ cup olive oil
Salt and pepper to taste
Lemon juice to taste
